Safety on the Road

ost drivers, at one time or another, encounter a perilous situation when behind the wheel of a car. In an emergency, panic is the real enemy. Knowing what to expect and being prepared can help prevent panic and maybe even save a life. Here are some tips that can help you in many emergency scenarios:

- Memorize the locations of window switches and door locks. Note whether the front doors unlock by just pulling the door handle. The locks on many vehicles can be programmed to unlatch with the handle.
- Don't forget obvious safety precautions, such as making sure that all of your tires—including the spare—are properly inflated.
- Keep a spare key with you or in a magnetic holder that you can hide on your car's exterior metal areas, such as a wheel well.
- Maintain an emergency kit that includes basic first aid supplies, a small shovel, a tow strap, jumper cables, reflective plastic triangles, multi-tool folding pocket tool, and rock salt or sand in snow country.
- Always bring your cell phone and its car charger with you, especially on long trips. Have the phone numbers for your local police, roadside assistance, and so on entered into your phone's contact list.

Consider Bamboo!

B amboo is quickly becoming a substitute for wood in many uses and is an ecologically responsible choice. In essence, bamboo is a weed, and it is one of the fastest growing plants on the planet. Because bamboo is a sustainable resource, meaning it replenishes itself in a short amount of time, the growing demand for bamboo doesn't deplete forests or cause the long-term devastation to habitat that logging wood forests can create. Strength wise, it has twice the compression strength of concrete and roughly the same strength-to-weight ratio as steel.

Bamboo products are often less expensive than wood products and are environmentally friendly. Bamboo doesn't require insecticides or pesticides to grow; therefore, it doesn't pollute waterways with chemical sprays and doesn't interfere with beneficial insects who live in the environment. Also, growing bamboo absorbs close to 30 tons of CO² for each acre planted, which helps reduce the heat emitted by human use into the environment.

Savor the Flavor

Southwestern Grilled Tri-tip

Rub:

2 tsp. chili powder

2 tsp. chopped jalapeño chile

2 tsp. salt

2 tsp. olive oil

2 Tbsp. lime juice

1 tsp. packed brown sugar

1 tsp. freshly ground pepper

Reef.

1 beef tri-tip roast (1 1/2 to 2 lb.)

Combine rub ingredients together. Rub tri-tip with the rub blend. Grill over direct heat 4 to 6 minutes or until lightly browned, turning once. Move beef to indirect heat and grill 15 to 20 minutes or until internal temperature reaches 120° to 150°F for medium rare or until desired doneness. Place roast on cutting board, cover loosely with foil. Let stand 10 minutes; thinly slice.

Increase Your Car's Resale Value

f you tend to keep a car until the wheels fall off, resale value doesn't matter. However, if you trade in your car every two or three years, it's a top consideration. Increase your car's resale value with these tips:

- Buy a car that will hold its value. Depreciation is the major equity killer—a vehicle loses about 30% of its value within the first year and up to 50% after three years. Do your research and choose a brand or model with a solid history of low depreciation rates.

- Maintenance is important. Document all maintenance and repair work to show the car has been well taken care of.
- Upgrades and options. Not all upgrades will add value at trade-in. There is, however, more demand for automatic transmissions than manual ones, and sunroofs and leather seats have been shown to add value to a car.
- Climate is key. Vehicles with fourwheel or all-wheel drive will have more value in colder areas, such as the Northeast. The opposite is true of convertibles.
